Principal's Message

Alhamdulillah, all praise and thanks is due to Allah for providing us with yet another fruitful and productive term. Thanks to our dedicated team, we are one step closer to the ideal college we aspire to be.

One of our greatest achievements so far this year is the revitalisation of our school culture. This can be seen on many fronts including the shift of language, behaviour and attitude among our staff, students and parents. The investment made last year in our College vision, mission and values have contributed immensely to this positive change; however we are still at the very early stages of establishing our institutional culture.

Our Secondary department has been busy with the addition of years seven and eight to our College, and our experienced secondary teachers we have been able to establish an effective teaching and learning routine. We have also busy in the Secondary department with the application for year nine and the renewal of registration for year seven and eight. The applications were due on the 31st of March and they have all been completed alhamdulilah.

Our Primary department has been busy consolidating a number of systems and programs introduced term four last year. These include the assessment schedule, homework structure, Mathletics and the Common A –E Grading Scale.

Another very exciting initiative has been the K-2 Literacy and Numeracy Action Plan (LNAP) which has a focus on improving the literacy and numeracy outcomes of students from K-2 by equipping teachers with evidence based techniques for pedagogical instruction. We have included our three to six teachers in the on-school professional development sessions to further enhance teacher capacity.

Our Learning and Support department have also achieved some great milestones this term including the development of more effective referral sys-

tems, Individual Learning plans, programs and procedures. They have also evaluated and redesigned our guided reading program to make it more suited to the needs of our students.

In addition to the social needs of our students we have also identified the need to strengthen our spiritual programs and the College is proud to announce the Young Scholars Program (YSP) which has been prepared by our College's Islamic Studies and Qur'an Coordinator, Mr Erol Kaso. The YSP is a four year foundations programs that consists of Qur'anic memorisation, Classical Arabic and Islamic studies. The YSP is open to only15 students, who have displayed academic and social excellence.

Alhamdulillah, The big news is the commencement of construction for our first permanent building. We are in the process of signing a contract with the building company and hope to get the go ahead by the end of the month. We are also in the process of applying for another DA to Fairfield Council which involves the increase of student numbers to 300 with stage development to 600 students insha'Allah. We are looking to submit the DA to council in May/June.

I would like to thank all of my staff for their hard work and dedication this term and pray that our school community enjoys a safe break in the upcoming holidays.

Assalamu Alaykum,


This term we have established a whole-school program to focus on the expected student expectations in various locations of the school. This program will work to instil our school's values and establish a culture for students to flourish.

OTHER IRFAN NEWS

A to E grading Scale

This year has seen some changes to the way in which we report to parents about student progress. We have adjusted our grading system to align with the NESA recommended A to E grading scale which lets teachers report student academic achievements at any point in time using clear standards.

Teachers make professional and balanced judgments to decide which grade best matched the students your child has achieved, and these judgments are based on assessment information collected at different points through the year.

The A to E grade scale summarises the standard or quality of achievement and describes the:

- depth of knowledge and understanding of the student and
- the range of skills that students should have at that particular grade level.

BOSTES (now NESA) have provided schools with more information about the A to E grade scale and samples of work which guide teachers when making decisions around grading.

Literacy Pro

Term 2 will see the start of the Literacy Pro (LitPro) program at Irfan College. This is a reading program that is based on lexile measures which assess the difficulty of a text or a student's reading ability. This allows students to read books that are within their ability range, and master the skills at each level before progressing to the next lexile measure or level.

Students need to complete an online literacy assessment/quiz to determine their individual level and they will then choose to read books from a range of books from the school library which have been grouped based on lexile levels.

Premier's Reading Challenge (PRC)

Each year school students are invited to participate in the Premier's Reading Challenge (PRC). This is a reading competition organised by the NSW government to encourage a love of reading in students, and enable them to access quality literature. The PRC is available to students in Kindergarten to Year 9 in all school settings. Books are chosen from a book list which is available on the PRC website. The 2017 Challenge started on the Monday 6 March and closes Friday 25 August at midnight for students. Please visit the PRC website for more information on the guidelines for participating in the PRC and to help your child make choices about what they want to read.

To encourage our students to read and become involved in the PRC, Irfan College has made a significant purchase of books listed on the PRC book list. These books have been catalogued and clearly marked, and students are able to access them through our school library. Below is the link to the PRC.


